Contrary to general opinion, Couchsurfing is NOT just about free sleeping space. But it is possibly the most efficient way to instantly learn about another culture when you've just landed in unfamiliar territory. While popular social networking sites like Twitter and Facebook allow you to generate thousands of friends at the click of a mouse, Couchsurfing, which began in 2003, brings networking to the next level: shared experiences and actual face-to-face relationships. Deepening their travels as they journey across the globe, "Couchsurfers" stay with hosts they have located on the site, (www.couchsurfing.com) rather than checking into a hotel. The opportunity to explore comes from meeting people (both locals and foreigners) who are culturally aware and open to teaching others, regardless of race, differences, and backgrounds.

Of course, this mode of traveling—and more specifically, trusting complete strangers—requires common sense. Safety is always a factor while on the road, so members help each other by referring or verifying others on the site, leaving reviews and comments on those with whom they have surfed or hosted. If traveling is all about seeing the world from a bigger perspective, then Couchsurfing does just that, and lets you not only see other folks, but interact with them on the home level.

At the heart of Couchsurfing is its mission: "To Create Inspiring Experiences." So, in exchange for a couch, you give your time, laughter, thoughts, conversation, insights, and...we hope you wash some dishes.
